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### Lost wedding ring reunited with its owner after six weeks

Tim and Joan Connell have been married for 51 years.

For 51 years, Joan has faithfully worn her wedding ring - a modest yet elegant gold and silver band with intricate detailing, and gone about her day, attending to whatever's on her agenda.

Unfortunately, Joan's daily ritual was disrupted in November when she discovered her wedding ring was no longer on her finger.

To put it simply, Joan was crushed.

In the past year, the ring had gradu

In the past year, the ring had gradually loosened, yet Joan remained true to her routine and never removed it.

On that fateful day in early November, she discovered it was no longer on her finger.

That day, Joan left her home in Carman and went to town. She had a list of errands to complete and went to several places in Carman, Winkler, and Morden, doing shopping before Christmas.

After a busy day of running errands, she stopped at the pharmacy in Carman to fill her prescription. It was then that she realized her ring was no longer on her finger. Instantly, a wave of panic set in and she began revisit-

ing all the spots she had visited earlier.

"I came home and ripped my bed apart, and took my garbage bag out and took it apart, and looked in the garbage, and backtracked to all the places I had been that day, and couldn't find my ring," said Joan.

She phoned multiple places she had been, leaving messages and talking to different people, hoping somebody had found her precious ring and turned it in. She even travelled back to many places she had gone, searching for the ring herself, but to no avail.

Fifty-one years, and now her ring was gone.

The weeks went by, and nothing.

"I had kind of given up hope," Joan said.

In Joan's mind, her wedding ring was gone forever.

On Dec. 19, while running some lastminute Christmas errands, as Joan often does looking for treasures, she stopped at Carman MCC Thrift Shop for a few minutes.

Suddenly, out the corner of her eye, she saw something she recognized. In the display case by the counter was her wedding ring... with a price sticker on it.

"That ring was meant to come back to you," the staff told her.

But the story doesn't end there.

A few days later, after getting her ring back, Joan returned to Carman MCC Thrift Shop, chatting with some staff about how her ring had shown up. One of the staff chimed in and told Joan they could add to that story.

Around five to six weeks ago, when Joan lost her ring, a little boy and his mother entered the shop. The little boy had a hurt finger, so he put on a glove support he found in the store. But when he pulled it off, a ring was in the glove.

When Joan was there on Dec. 19, she

tried on the same glove, but her ring had slid off and was left inside the glove, and left in there, unnoticed.

Later, when the boy found it inside that same glove, he and his mom returned the ring to the staff, not knowing it had been reported missing.

Joan said she is very grateful to the young boy that he was honest enough to hand the ring in.

"It meant so much to me to get it back," she said.

Joan is so grateful to have her ring back that she urges the young boy to come forward so she can give him a little reward for being so honest and handing in the ring.

"After wearing this ring for 51 years,

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### Federal government partners with FCM to strengthen asset management

The Honourable Sean Fraser, Minister of Housing, Infrastructure and Communities, and Scott Pearce, President of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM), announced a federal investment of over \$270,000 to help six communities in Manitoba implement innovative strategies to manage their municipal infrastructure on

The funding announced comes from the Municipal Asset Management Program (MAMP), which is a \$110-million program funded by the Government of Canada and delivered by the Federation of Canadian Municipalities.

Known as asset management, this investment will help the communities ensure that their infrastructure such as arenas, bridges, drinking water and wastewater systems, and roads are working as efficiently as possible.

It will also allow them to make better

investment decisions. Asset management additionally helps reduce risks so municipalities can provide reliable and affordable services and a high quality of life to their residents.

Among the communities receiving funding are the Rural Municipality of Macdonald and the Municipality of Lorne, who are each receiving \$50,000 to develop their own asset management policy, strategy, and plan, helping them generate data on key municipal assets.

The Town of Carman will receive \$50,000 to help implement an asset management strategy with a software called CityWide. The Town will gain a more advanced understanding of asset performance, and be able to more effectively plan for future maintenance based on data-driven decisions, put in place more effective asset management practices and provide for more accurate asset management reporting.

"The \$50,000 is to be used towards the purchase of asset management software," said Susan Stein, Chief Administrative Officer for the Town of Carman. "The Town purchased PSD Citywide, which they have implemented and developed an Asset Management Strategy. The strategy included mapping assets, and determining conditions of assets. They have started doing so in 2022 and 2023. We are working towards developing a full asset management plan in the upcoming years."

Under the Investing in Canada Plan that this funding falls under, the Government of Canada is investing over \$180 billion over 12 years in municipal asset management, in public transit projects, green infrastructure, social infrastructure, trade and transportation routes, and rural and northern communities across Canada.

Local musicians will be performing the songs of the late Gordon Lightfoot and John Prine at the Park St. gallery on Friday, Jan. 19 starting at 7 p.m. Admission is free.

The festival's coffeehouse nights are a great way to bring music-lovers together and give local musicians the chance to perform, says organizer Bill Dowling.

"We've done Leonard Cohen, Gord Downie, Tom Petty ... it always draws a nice crowd and it's a nice way to gather local musicians around a theme," he says.

Prine and Lightfoot, who both passed away in recent years, were good friends with similar styles, so it seemed a good match to honour them both this time around, Dowling said.

Musicians who have signed up to perform that night include Dowling, Steven Dueck, Jenessa Kehler, and Karl Redding, to name a few.

"We see it as part of our mandate is to just try to encourage people to play," Dowling says. "A lot of us, like myself and Steve Dueck and Scott Bell, we all got used to getting out there and playing because of the Back 40 way back in the day. They ran coffeehouses and that sort of thing, and that's how we got started, in those kinds of venues.

So we're trying to carry on that whole tradition and keep it going."

Along those lines, the Back 40 also has a concert scheduled for the P.W. Enns Centennial Concert Hall on Friday, Feb. 23 featuring singer-songwriters from across the region. Ticket information will be available soon on the concert hall's website.

Funds from that show will go to support the 2024 festival, which takes place in Morden Park on Sunday,

Dowling says they're just getting started on planning for the festival.

"We're looking forward to it," he says, noting last year's event, which focused very much on local talent, was very well-received. "So we're thinking we might continue moving in that direction, but we're still talking about what we're doing."

### Morden is ready for the Scotties

Excitement is building for when the top female curlers from across Manitoba arrive in Morden for the 2024 Morden Scotties Tournament of Hearts next week.

CurlManitoba executive director Craig Baker anticipates Morden will be putting on a great week for the curlers and fans alike.

"I think it's going to be a phenomenal event down there ... and it's always exciting to see an arena transform into a curling club for a week," said Baker.

"It looks like they've had some great support. It looks like the community is behind it," he continued. "Any community we end up in down there, we get tremendous support ... it shows the desire of the fans to be there.

"The biggest thing is, when we come into a community like Morden, we kind of become the show. We don't get lost, and the community rallies behind it," he added. "We see the community support and what they do to make it special ... there's that desire for it and there's the support for it."

Teams arrive a day ahead of the competition, which runs Jan. 24-28. Twelve teams will be playing in the round robin Wednesday to Friday, with three draws daily. The elimination playoff round then goes Saturday and Sunday.

Activities start Tuesday evening with a banquet for the teams and sponsors at the Access Event Centre.

Saturday evening features a social with live music for anybody who wants to attend. It's \$10 a ticket, and they will be available at the door if there's room.

Organizing committee chairperson Ernie Epp said last week that everything was in place and there have been good ticket sales so far.

"Sales of tickets are going really well. CurlManitoba stated last month already that our sales are really good in comparison to what they normally see, so that's thrilling for us.

"We expect to see a fair number

of people, and I think part of what helps is there's one team that's fairly local," Epp said in reference to the Carman foursome skipped by Shaela Hayward.

The excitement built even further Monday when the volunteers came to pick up their clothing and materials, Epp noted.

"It will the first time that about 200 of us are all together, and I was really looking forward to it. It was excit-

And he paid tribute to the volunteers and other supporters who have really rallied to make the championship a success.

"Morden is a community where volunteering is second nature to a pretty big percentage of the population," Epp said. "It was a little of here's what we need to do, and off they go, and they will make Morden look good.

"It's important for me that we recognize all of the volunteers and how tremendous it is that there are people willing to help out," he continued. "And the business community and what they have done for sponsorship. We've exceeded our target with corporate sponsorship with fundraising, so that's been a phenomenal

"There's response still happening," Epp added, noting the Morden Chamber of Commerce sent a notice out to its members encouraging them to decorate and help make the week special. "I'm hoping that there's a whole bunch more businesses who are going to be sharing that excitement."

Five of the top 20 teams on the women's Canadian team rankings (CTRS) will compete at the Scotties.

The top seed status went to the rink skipped by Kaitlyn Lawes (Selena Njegovan, Jocelyn Peterman, Kristin MacCuish). Currently ranked CTRS #4, Lawes and her Fort Rouge team finished second in the preliminary round a year ago with a 7-1 record but lost the semi-final to Abby Ack-

Cameron (Meghan Walter, Taylor Mc-Donald, Mackenzie Elias). Walter and Elias were half of the Ackland Scotties playoff team a year ago.



son's Assiniboine Memorial team had a 5-3 record a year ago. Watling and her East St. Paul team won the Scotties berth bonspiel and a strong local bonspiel showing placed them at the top of the MCT rankings.

Two other Manitoba teams, also ranked in the top three of the Canadian team rankings, have already qualified for the national Scotties in Calgary in February. Kerri Einarson's defending champions currently occupy the CTRS #3 spot, while wild card entry Jennifer Jones is currently CTRS #2.



We have had a successful 2023/2024 season thus far and we are excited to continue on with that success and compete for that Manitoba Buffalo.



By 1966, Carman and Dufferin were investigating the potential of hiring a full-time recreation director. The volunteers of the Carman and Community Recreation Association were struggling to handle all that came with the communities' expanding needs.

Carman was the first town in Manitoba to employ such a director, hiring Brian Brown between 1947 and 1948.

When he left, no other subsequent director was hired. Instead, a slate of programmers oversaw seasonal events in the summer, while various manag-

ers handled the arena.

Discussions continued over the proceeding years, eventually leading to a proposed funding merger of Carman and Dufferin. If successful, it would mark the first time in the Manitoba a rural municipality and a town had united in a program of this nature.

In 1968, the two councils formed Carman-Dufferin

Recreation Commission, and, in 1970, announced they would share the salary of Cesare Gianna of Winnipeg.

Gianna's office would be in the Memorial Hall. After 26 months, he resigned. A string of short-term employees followed, and the office location similarly disappeared.

In 2003, the job title was changed to general manager of recreation services. Since 2017, with no director position, the office has been overseen by a recreation coordinator.




