Holiday Smile Cookie spreads Christmas Cheer

Manitoba's 123rd Christmas Bird Count is underway around the province

Instead of counting the number of holiday parties you're going to, what if you counted birds instead? From Dec. 14 to Jan. 5, the Christmas Bird Count (CBC), North America's longest-running citizen science project, takes place, and anyone interested can participate.

The CBC was created in 1900 by conservationists to encourage the public to count birds instead of hunting them. According to the official rules, each count is done in a circle with a 24-kilometre diameter. Each circle has a compiler who selects a count day, coordinates with the volunteers and divides everyone up to cover the circle depending on how many people are participating, and if they are solo or going out in groups.

Pending weather disruptions, 21 counts will occur across Manitoba this year.

Volunteer birders receive checklists, signs that say "Christmas Bird Count In Progress" (if they are driving) and maps outlining their allocated area. They then travel by foot, ski, snowshoe or vehicle to look, listen and record the number and types of birds they see. Volunteers can also watch their feeders and count from indoors, or use a combination of methods to count the birds in their area. Often, at the end of the count day, everyone gathers to enjoy refreshments and discuss what they saw.

"I like the comradeship," said Bonnie Chartier, the organizer for the Gimli count. "It's a small community, and it's fun to catch up with people."

In addition to organizing the Gimli count on Dec. 19, she helps count in other circles since she's an experienced birder. However, you don't need to be an experienced birder to participate in the CBC.

"With new people, you make sure to put them with someone who's an experienced birder so they can learn the differences between a northern hawk owl and a great gray owl, for example," says Char-

The information volunteers document through the CBC is important for assessing long-term trends in the bird populations of North America. Gerald Machnee, the organizer for the Selkirk CBC, says that some birds are not observed every year, while a few have been observed only a few times in 30

"There have been a few birds that should not be here for the CBC, especially the yellow-rumped warbler that was counted in 2015," says Machnee. "They will not survive once the temperature goes below about -20 C."

Manitoba's collective CBC data results from hundreds of hours of observation and thousands of kilometres covered by volunteers. Last year, the house sparrow counted the most (21,213 times) followed by the common redpoll (6546 times), then snow buntings (5824 times).

James Duncan is the creator of Discover Owls, a retired conservation zoologist, and the organizer for the Balmoral CBC for almost 30 years. Duncan says that doing and publishing scientific research plays an essential role. Still, unless you get the public invested and involved by making nature a part of their lives, the research alone lacks the "conservation punch" needed to drive change



Weir noted there was great atten-





Carman & Community Chamber year-in-review

On Dec. 12, the Carman and Community Chamber of Commerce held its final Chamber Meeting of 2023.

The Chamber is excited to partner with the Carman Collegiate Robotics Club for another year. A group of five club representatives came out and gave a presentation at the Chamber meeting to report on how it did over the past year.

Alongside a new club leader in Melissa Ziehlke, the club is looking to expand and do more things in the future. It is seeking \$1,000 for the new robots, and the Chamber is asking businesses for \$100 each to help contribute to the club.

A few community reports were shared, including the Boyne Lodge Personal Care Home, which gave some updates on its landscaping project over the last year.

The Town of Carman gave an update on tree planting in town, and how council meetings will be chang-

ing going forward. As in 2024, it will have two council meetings per month. Previously, council held four monthly meetings spread out between the many sub-committees.

This was also Tyler King's last meeting as the economic development officer with the Town of Carman, and he has moved on to a new position with Boyne Care Holdings. His focus there will be getting the new assisted living building project going and built in the near future.

The Carman Rec Department provided an update on local sports and leisure activities that are available in Carman this winter. These can be checked out on the Town of Carman

The Chamber's executive director, Jodi Winkler, noted that the Holiday Hoopla was a big success last week. A big congrats went out to all of the winners including Glenn Smith, who won \$1,000 in Chamber Bucks. All the businesses were very happy with how the day went, Winkler said.

Keep The Cheer Here has also raised over \$2,000 so far, and every day in December until Dec. 23, it will give out \$100 in Chamber Bucks. The Chamber Bucks need to be redeemed in December for anyone who has won a prize.

Finally, Carman is hosting the U21 Junior Curling Provincials from Feb. 21 to 25 at the Carman Golf and Curling Club, and the host committee is looking for volunteers for the event.

Now that the Blue Crescent Hotel in town is up and running, Carman is looking to have a successful event hosting these Junior Provincials, as the town would like to host the provincial Scotties Tournament of Hearts within the next five years.

Garden Club supports community growing projects

Following a successful plant sale and garden tour, the Carman Garden Club will be donating \$1,500 to several growing projects in the town and surrounding area. The Boyne River Keepers and Dufferin Agricultural Society will each receive \$400, which will go towards landscaping around the new dock at Ryall Park and for prizes in the vegetable, fruit and flower sections at the Carman Fair.

Carman Palliative Care and Boyne Towers will each receive \$150 to be used for their garden areas. Palliative Care plans to invest in self-watering planters, and the Boyne Towers residents will plant flowers and vegetables in Boyne Park.

Local schools were each granted \$100 to be used for growing projects, including raised beds, corner pockets, and outdoor revitalization. Several schools are planting indigenous grasses as they learn more about indigenous perspectives through their

curriculum.

"Although the donations are only a small contribution towards many of the projects, the Carman Garden Club supports the endeavours of the school students and staff to create welcoming outdoor grounds," said Barbara Lepp of the Carman Garden Club. "Ideas included fruit tree plantings, haskap bushes, flowers, vegetables, and grasses."

Roland School, École Carman Elementary, Elm Creek School and Carman Collegiate will each receive \$100 from the Garden Club.

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Local businesses band together to support Cheer Board

Local businesses have been supporting the Carman and District Christmas Cheer Board more than ever this year, making for full hampers this holiday season.

Since 2020, the local cheer board has switched to only accepting monetary donations, allowing them to buy every single item for the hampers rather than giving everyone different food items that were donated.

"While people may be disappointed in the loss of 'a tin for the bin' type of collections, this model has been a great improvement for our board," said Deana Gauld, board chairman. "Financial donations help us get the items we need, and we can guarantee safe, fresh food for our recipients."

Homestead Co-op is a big partner for the local cheer board, ordering the groceries for them as they go on sale in November, then storing them until the hampers are ready to be packed. They bring in stuffing, cranberry sauce, cake mix, peanut butter, pasta, and sauce. Instead of giving ham and turkey in the hampers, the cheer board gives a gift card for families to use to purchase a meat of their choice for dinner or other groceries they may need.

The cheer board also gives a gift for each child of the family in each hamper. Red Apple ran their Fill Santa's Sleigh event again this year, which brought in numerous toys for the hampers and an opportunity for people to give financial donations. Home Hardware also set out a table of

wished-for toys and mitts for people to buy and donate as the cheer board is hoping to include those, along with neck warmers, in their hampers.

"The result is thousands of dollars of toys purchased locally and donated to families," said Gauld.

This year, the cheer board has also been fundraising for hygiene items like shampoo, soap, and body wash. Gauld said though those items are outside the board's mandate, being clean is an important part of feeling good, being confident, and for children, fitting in. That's why Gallery Dental donated toothbrushes and toothpaste for the hampers this year, and why The Prices Rite created the opportunity for customers to make a \$5 donation to go towards a child's hygiene pack.

Carman Pharmacy also gave their customers the chance to donate hygiene items for adults, which includes soap and body wash. Newman Hand Insurance and Rural Buds Cannabis each made a \$500 donation - Newman Hand gave it for hygiene bags and Rural Buds gave it for deodorant to be added to the bags. Birch and Honey Salon collected feminine hygiene products for the cheer board this year too.

"Again, not our mandate," stated Gauld. "However, if they are donated to us, we are happy to use our hampers as an avenue to get them to women, as they are expensive and necessary."

Tim Hortons also partnered with the cheer board this year, donating \$1,500

from their Holiday Smile Cookie week to them and Carman Food Pantry, who serves the same families as the cheer board.

"Our board members are so grateful for the enthusiastic support from our community," said Gauld. "We could not do this without everyone pitching in."

She added that these partnerships allow them to give as much as they can to the families in need. They have 170 hampers going out this year, and with everything being more expensive this year than ever before, the support from all the local businesses has made all the hampers possible.

"I want everyone who has donated, whether it was change dropped into the collection at the Sonatrice concert, a toy, a \$5 donation for a hygiene bag, or a donation of your hard-earned dollars, to know we appreciate it," said Gauld. "We all feel the stress of the holidays and yet, we also know many living right here struggle every day all year. This is an opportunity to help them, to let them know we see them, and we care for them as a part of our community."

The Alzheimer's Society of Manitoba has several options available to people in the Carman area to help with people living with dementia and dementia awareness.

In an effort to keep people informed about the debilitating cognitive disease, Carman United Church is hosting a viewing and group discussion of the One Small Seed video series.

It will be held on Jan. 16 from 1:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the Carman United Church. The Alzheimer's Society of Manitoba will be present to for a question and answer forum covering the content in the videos or any other questions about dementia.

The Morden Activity Centre is also hosting a screening of the documentary *Alive Inside* on Jan. 10 at 11:30 a.m. The film presents the power of music on memory and positive experiences for people living with dementia. A trailer of the film can be viewed here: https://www.aliveinside.us/#land.

Call Morden Activity Centre ahead to pre-order lunch, which will be available during the showing at 204-822-3555.

There is also a care partner support group at the Carman Active Living Centre, which is held on the last Wednesday of every month from 1 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. December's session is cancelled and will recommence in January.

Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia can leave those affected and their care partners feeling isolated. You are not alone. There are other people to share the journey with you.

"Support groups offer the opportunity to meet, interact with and learn from others who are living with dementia," said Rebecca Atkinson, Southcentral regional coordinator for the Alzheimer's Society of Manitoba.

"It's a safe environment where you can share, laugh, and help each other through mutual understanding. We currently offer in-person and virtual support groups to meet you where you're at. All of our support groups are inclusive environments for people of different ethnicities, cultures or persons who identify as part of the 2SLGBTQ+ community."

At any time, people can call or email the Alzheimer's Society of Manitoba to share their emotions and experiences and receive support.

"Call with questions or ideas, as

Flashback... The Steak Pit: unique dining experience

Mike and Annie Dorfman's Store, which was located directly east of The Carman, closed in 1964 and sat vacant. Four years later Frank and Marie Graboweski had become the new owners of Carman Motor Inn, after a brief hotel stint in Altona.

During extensive travels in North America and Spain, they conceived the idea of adding "The Flame Room" or — as it is more commonly known in these parts — "The Steak Pit."

They knocked down Dorfmans, and by 1974 the addition, increasing the restaurant's seating from 87 to 172.

When the work was complete, the couple invited Carman residents to a grand opening ceremony — eager to introduce the community to their new (and novel) dining experience.

The concept of customers selecting choice cuts then barbequing the meet to their personal satisfaction on an open pit was unique to Manitoba. Representatives at the opening from

the Manitoba Hotel Association recognized the restaurant as the only one of its kind granted approval by the provincial liquor board.

For decades, Carman and area residents went nowhere before first meeting at The Steak Pit. Thousands of customers enjoyed the unique dining experience. "It now is no longer in use.

Anyone recall the two water fountains too?

portunity to have fun with family and friends while having these experiences counting birds...[and] making valuable contributions to our knowledge of bird populations," said Duncan. "Most importantly, they become stronger advocates against things that may impact birds...because they've been getting up close and personal counting them."

Chartier has been birding for almost 30 years. She remembers wondering what made birding so interesting until she saw a common redpoll through

binoculars for the first time.

"I've been birding since I was a young person in Churchill. It started because I was just curious what all these ladies in goofy hats were looking at. I spotted a small brown bird with a red cap and a red chest. After that, I wanted to see what they all look like up close. When you see them through binoculars, it's so different."

Last year, Carman's Bird Count recorded 34 species and 1,447 individual birds. Notable species were an American Kestrel that was spotted in Barnsley and a Red-bellied Wood-

pecker in Carman. House Sparrow, Rock Pigeon, Wild Turkeys, and Snow Buntings were the most counted with a combined total of 902 individuals. On the other end of the count numbers, there was one American Robin and a lonely Red-winged Blackbird that both had decided not to migrate south. A big thank you to the nine individuals that counted by car and foot and covered 403 kilometers of roads in total and the 17 individuals that stayed in the warmth of their homes to count the birds that appeared in their yard and feeders.

This year we are hoping to spot the pair of Northern Cardinals that are frequenting feeders in the south east portion of Carman


Valley Twisters head coach Braeden Beernaerts. "We've gained a lot of traction since the start of the year knowing that if we play our game, we always have a chance."

and a .909 save percentage.


The Twisters are back in action with a road game on Dec. 19 against the St. Vital Victorias with puck drop at 7:30 p.m.

Mateychuk gets the Christmas gift he's longed for

It was a year ago when the only gift on Denton Mateychuk's Christmas wish list never came.

The Dominion City product was enjoying a stellar campaign on the blue line with the Moose Jaw Warriors in the Western Hockey League and looked primed to represent Canada at the U20 World Junior Championships on home soil. But when it was announced who would don the Maple Leaf at the annual holiday tournament, Mateychuk's name wasn't on the list.

Mateychuk wouldn't be denied this time around. Earlier this month, Mateychuk, along with Straithclair product Conor Geekie, were told they'd be among the 23 players to wear the Red and White at the 2024 World Junior Championships in Gothenburg, Sweden from Dec. 26 to Jan. 5.

Canada, the two-time reigning champions, opens its tournament against Finland on Boxing Day .

"It's obviously an awesome honour to be on this team and it's always awesome to put on the maple leaf," said Mateychuk, who represented Canada at the U18 World Junior Championships in 2020. "I think it started last year, not making the team, and it kind of sets you back a little bit, because you want to be able to represent your country.

"I just used it as motivation and then you get into the summer and it helps with the training and everything and I've been playing my best hockey so I think that's all the reasons that went into making this team."

Mateychuk, the first-round pick of the Columbus Blue Jackets in 2022, is on pace for a career year with Moose Jaw, tallying six goals and 29 assists in 24 contests. His 35 points are the fourth-most among defenceman in the league, despite missing the first 10 games while at Blue Jackets' training camp.

"I've felt good on the ice," he said. "I had a good

(training) camp in Columbus and then come back to Moose Jaw and bring back those pro habits that you see every day there and use that in the WHL and I think I've done a pretty good job of that and it's shown on the ice, I think."

Indeed, the 19-year-old is carrying himself with a different swagger than the one who came up short a year ago, and Warriors head coach Mark O'Leary has taken notice of his captain.

"The big thing is his patience with not forcing things that are not there. What I mean by that is in early parts when he started, it was all offence all the time," O'Leary said.

"Now he's learned to trust his ability to check it, to let the plays develop, be sound defensively, and when he does that he's able to be in possession and pick his spots to create offence."

The Warriors (18-14-0-2) are third in the Eastern Conference at the holiday reprieve. The club will be without Mateychuk for a handful of contests out of the break, but O'Leary will manage as they cheer on their fearless leader from 6,700 kilometres away.

"Just being able to watch how far Denton's come as a young 15 year old when he first started playing games with us— how hard he's worked to develop into the player he is now, whether that's the off-ice work that he's done, the attention that he puts to detail, the video work, just working on his skating," O'Leary said.

"He's our captain for a reason. He does everything like a professional and to see a guy like that be rewarded with this opportunity is very special."

Mateychuk's priority is defending Canada's title for a second time, but he would be remised to not soak up the number of learning opportunities that await in the international competition. Perhaps another gift this holiday season came in the form of former NHL defenceman Brent Seabrook, who is a

part of this year's management team.

Canada begins its title defence with two pre-tournament games on Dec. 19 against a U-25 team from Denmark and then tests against fellow WJHC participants Switzerland and United States on Dec. 22 and 23. Canada's tournament schedule begins on Boxing Day in a game against Finland at 7:30 a.m. central. All games can be viewed live on TSN.

The Red River Mud Bugs of the Hanover Tache Junior Hockey League (HTJHL) have their sights set on provincial glory, after a strong start to the season.

The HTJHL operates exclusively in the southeastern part of the province and is the only Junior C league in Manitoba, and as such, league champions are also named provincial Junior C champions.

"This team was formed around 15 years ago with the purpose of giving boys who can't commit to Junior A, Junior B, etcetera, as they are either in university or working and want a place to play junior hockey," said head coach Bill Dowswell. "The

HTJHL is an eight-team league and is very competitive every single game."

Although they play out of St. Jean-Baptiste, the Mud Bugs are made up of players primarily from the Al-tona area.

"The bulk of our team is from Altona, and they keep the team alive," Dowswell said. "We also have local guys from St. Jean and Morris, and a few from Winkler and Portage."

Through the midway point of the season, the Mud Bugs are in first place in the HTJHL standings with a record of 10-3-2.

"Our season is going pretty good so far. We had a slow start with a couple of overtime losses, but we have recently reeled off eight straight wins. We have a very tight group, and after losing in the league finals last year, the boys are hungry."

Whether they're decorative or functional, stockings can be an integral component of holiday decor in a



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
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


